



"Accelerated Reading"



What is "Accelerated Reader?"

- A reading system that allows teachers to monitor children's independent reading.
- Accelerated reader not only keeps a record of books read but also assesses children's understanding of what they have read – their reading comprehension.
- Your child picks a book from the library at his/her own level then, when they have read the book, they take a short quiz on the computer – passing the quiz indicates to teachers that the child has understood what they have read.

Why is reading comprehension important?

- The ability to read is one of the most important skills any person can have.
- Reading comprehension enables children to access all areas of the school curriculum and life in general.
- It is the understanding of the text being read and how this is interpreted that supports educational progress and lifelong learning.

How is Accelerated Reader used at Warden House?

- At Warden House, Accelerated Reader is used primarily in KS2 however some confident readers in year 2 may also use the system.
- At the beginning of the year children take a Star Reading test. The purpose of this test is to check the children's accelerated reader level.
- Teachers assign a level to each child based on the Star Reading test.
- 3. Children choose books from the level they are given.
- 4. When the children have read the book they take a quiz.
- 5. Children pass the quiz is they score over 80%. When they achieve 5 quizzes at 80%+ they move onto the next level.


Star Reading Test Example




Reading Quiz Example.

How Accelerated Reader motivates.

- Children can choose books independently and use a computer to assess progress, giving them instant feedback.
- Each book is given a points value children earn points according to how well they pass the quiz.
- Children receive rewards from Mrs Garlinge for passing 5 quizzes.
- Children receive certificates of achievement as they improve their comprehension skills.

How Accelerated Reader motivates.

- AR records the number of words that children read and prizes are given for million word readers.
- Class awards are given at the end of each term for the most quizzes passed or, in KS1, the most books read.
- Whole school awards may be achieved at the end of each year for the number of books read.

Reading at EYFS and KS1.

- In KS1 a book banding system is used. The books are levelled by colour from Red to Gold.
- Up to the orange banding, the children read 20 books and are then assessed both on reading and comprehension to see if they are ready to move on.
- Above orange, the children read 30 books.
- The expectation is that children read every night.

"Accelerated Reader" and children with SEN.

- Children with memory or certain speech and language needs may have difficulties retaining facts about what they have read and so will be supported while reading and taking the quiz.
- Dyslexic children will only use Accelerated Reader if appropriate.
- The needs of individual children are always taken into account and adaptations made when necessary.

Questions to use with your children.

- Questions that find certain "facts" in the text.
 - Eg. What colour was Sarah's jumper?
- Questions where the answer is not directly in the text.
 - Eg. Charlie was crying. His shoulders shook as he sobbed.
 - How does Charlie feel?
- Questions about the book itself.
 - Eg. What is the title? Who is the author?

Questions to use with your children.

- Questions about the words that have been used.
 - Eg. What word could we use instead of happy? Why do you think the author has used this word?
- Other question ideas can be found in the handout.

Parents as partners.

- Encourage your child to read every day.
- Listen to your child read as often as you can.
 - For younger children this should be every day.
 - For older children this should be at least three times a week.
- Ask your child questions about what they have read.
- Read when you are out and about menus, signs, posters.
- Read for information newspapers, non-fiction books, the internet.

Parents as partners.

 Read to your child or if you have more than one child encourage them to read to each other.

- Join the library.

Questions.

 Could Accelerated Reader be introduced earlier to younger children?

Accelerated Reader can be introduced to children in Year 1 if they are confident readers and most importantly understand what they are reading. When a child reaches Gold reading level they take a STAR assessment test and if they score above a level 2.6 in the test they will be moved onto accelerated reader.
