Online Safety Alert – MoMo

Dear Parents and Carers,

I am writing to you regarding a significant concern that we have regarding some of our children's awareness of "MoMo" – a sinister craze that is becoming widely talked about online and amongst children in all year groups both inside and outside of school.

"Momo" seems to target young children on social media. A very sinister-looking doll encourages them to add a contact on messaging service WhatsApp, then hounds them with violent images and dares – some of which seem to encourage children to self-harm, sometimes stating that if they do not carry out a particular act, then they, or one of their loved ones will be killed. This is obviously causing some of our children a considerable amount of distress and worry. Please <u>click here</u> for further details.

This week, we have noticed that some of our children have been talking about "MoMo" in school and some have even chosen to role-play this during play times. As a school, we have ask all teachers to talk to their children about the inappropriateness of this and to ensure that any playtime games based around this are stopped straight away.

Organisations such as the Police and NSPCC have also released statements saying that the danger lays with children feeling pressured to either follow the orders on any app by carrying out "challenges", or because of peer pressure in chat rooms. The game 'MoMo' and can be accessed via websites or apps such as Whatsapp, Youtube and Facebook. Whatsapp is currently only allowed for those over the age of 16 years old; Facebook and YouTube are for those over 13 years old.

As you know – we actively teach online safety here at Warden House, however we strongly recommend that you speak to your children about keeping themselves safe online and you may also want to check your parental controls and search histories. Many excellent tips and guidance can be found on the NSPCC's website on how to do this. These can be accessed at <u>www.nspcc.org.uk.</u> On Facebook, there is also a resource '<u>EST E-Safety</u>' which can give you, as parents, excellent tips to keep your child safe online.
